Choices In Community Living is a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organization founded in Dayton, Ohio in 1985, providing person-centered, integrated community-based services and programs for individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities. Services and programs are licensed and certified by the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities, in conjunction with county boards of developmental disabilities services. During 2023, services and programs were provided in the following counties: Butler; Clark; Hamilton; Madison; Montgomery; Preble; and Warren.

Choices mission is to assist people with developmental disabilities to have access to build safe, healthy, and meaningful lives in the community.


Our primary funding source is Medicaid (88%), with

additional support from state and local revenues, including the Montgomery County Human Services Levy (2% Levy.) Donations and proceeds from fundraising efforts (grants, Jingle Bucks, Giving Tuesday and more) support quality of life needs that are not funded by Medicaid or other funding sources, including clothing, eye glasses, hearing aids, medical equipment, furniture and home furnishings; recreation, holiday and birthday gifts and more.

We are governed by a policy-making board of trustees that serve in a volunteer capacity and represent families, clients, business, government, and the community. 
Greg Gromosiak was named the Direct Support Professional of the Year by the Ohio Alliance of Direct Support Professionals.
